INSTALLATION CEREMONY

Heather Montemayor, City Clerk, administered the oath of office to Vice Mayor Hudak.

Commissioner Preston congratulated Vice Mayor Hudak. Thereafter, he commented on the unique nature of democracy in the United States and stated that the often-used term can carry different meanings, but at its core reflects a system in which supreme power is vested in the people. He explained that this principle enables elected officials to serve their communities and reinforces that no one is above the law. Lastly, Commissioner Preston thanked everyone for the opportunity to serve, as it has been his distinct privilege.

Vice Mayor Hudak thanked Commissioner Preston for his support. Thereafter, he reflected on his seven years in office, and stated that while he has faced many difficult decisions, the past year has been the most challenging. He commented on key votes involving public safety services, the Axis project, and potential Live Local developments, all of which required careful consideration and, at times, resulted in difficult tradeoffs. He explained that, as an elected official, it is not possible to satisfy every constituent, particularly when decisions involve competing outcomes, such as the development at Federal Highway and Eller Drive. Thereafter, he provided a brief overview of the project and outcome, whereby, resident input helped shape meaningful project improvements, including a reduction in height and density, traffic protections, and over \$1.2 million in infrastructure enhancements. Vice Mayor Hudak stated that disagreements do not mean concerns were ignored, as decisions must account for citywide impacts, legal considerations, and long-term consequences.

Continuing, Vice Mayor Hudak stated that his goal has been to enhance transparency and accessibility by establishing quarterly District 1 meetings, monthly Saturday office hours, and a district newsletter to keep residents informed and engaged. He encouraged residents to stay engaged and share their perspectives, while acknowledging that not all decisions can result in universally favorable outcomes. He explained that all Commission decisions are made with thorough research, open debate, and the City's best interests in mind. He commented on the transition from the Broward Sheriff's Office (BSO), which was a decision driven by fiscal responsibility and the desire for greater local control. Vice Mayor Hudak stated that he will continue to make thoughtful, sometimes difficult decisions in his final year in office, balancing legal, financial, and community priorities. Lastly, he expressed appreciation for the opportunity to serve and for his colleagues' shared dedication to Deerfield Beach.

Leo Figueroa, 8751 West Broward Boulevard, Plantation, representing the applicant, waived the quasi-judicial proceeding. Thereafter, he highlighted a brief PowerPoint presentation. He explained that the applicant is proposing to construct a new one-story, 2,036 square foot bank, along with associated site improvements, including parking, drive-thru lanes, drainage, a dumpster enclosure, landscaping, and pedestrian connectivity.

In response to Commissioner Plaut's question, Mr. Figueroa replied that the drive-thru will be located on the westside of the building.

Commissioner Plaut spoke in support of the project.

In response to Mayor Drosky's questions, Mr. Figueroa replied that no variances are being requested. Further, he explained that the existing water easements will not need to be relocated; however, swales will be adjusted and additional infrastructure will be installed.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Dan Herz, 330 SE 19th Avenue, Deerfield Beach, commented on the approval on the professional services agreement with LPRM Ascend Advisors, LLC.

Jess Del Vecchio, 7505 Cedarwood Circle, Boca Raton, requested that the Farmer's Market be extended through the summer months.

Roger Freitag, 418 SE 2nd Street, Deerfield Beach, requested that the prohibition of back-in parking at the Cove be re-evaluated. Further, he expressed concerns regarding the condition of the railroad crossings and requested that the matter be investigated. Lastly, he urged the City to explore options to gain greater control over its electricity.

Jonathan Ounjian, 1938 NE 6th Street, Deerfield Beach, commented on a recent Charter Review Board meeting and expressed concerns regarding the beach traffic, parking areas, and dilapidated fire station. Thereafter, he suggested that staff explore public-private partnership (P3) opportunities, as he does not want Deerfield Beach to become stagnant. Lastly, he spoke in support of reasonable, responsible growth.

DEPARTMENTAL BUSINESS**14. Update regarding public safety.**

Sean Gladieux, Director of Public Safety, highlighted a brief PowerPoint presentation. Thereafter, he commented on his visit to the Boca Raton Fire Training facility. He stated that the transitional Fire Chief and Police Chief positions have been posted since March 16, 2026, with interviews scheduled for April and onboarding anticipated in May depending on the selected candidates' current obligations. Further, the community engagement meetings will occur in April and May, with the first scheduled for April 16, 2026 at 7:00 p.m. in the Tigner Center. Thereafter, he introduced John Bukata, Transition Manager, and provided a brief overview of his background.

Mr. Bukata stated that he is excited and looks forward to working with the community.

Mr. Gladieux outlined ongoing efforts, including identifying facility logistics, coordinating with FDOT and contractors on the SW 10th Street Project, maintaining engagement with municipal public safety partners, and continuing vendor outreach to secure the most competitive pricing, among other initiatives. Thereafter, he briefly outlined the revenue generated from the RedSpeed program. Further, he stated that multiple requests have been made to the BSO for a comprehensive capital inventory, but no response has been received to date; however, staff will continue to follow up and engage with the BSO. Lastly, he provided an overview of current staffing levels.

Mayor Drosky commented on the current staffing levels, which is concerning, as Deerfield Beach has become a training ground.

DEPARTMENTAL BUSINESS - CONTINUED

Mr. Gladieux stated that he will work with Captain Hofstein to obtain staffing data to determine whether new deputies are retained or reassigned.

In response to Commissioner Shanetzky's question, Mr. Gladieux replied that the RedSpeed program has been temporarily halted; however, staff is actively exploring options to reinstate it.

Rodney Brimlow, City Manager, stated that staff anticipates the program will be operational by the next school year; however, deputies continue to patrol the school zones and enforce speed limits. Further, he explained that the temporary halt does not result in a loss of revenue, as the funds are accrued and applied to the next fiscal year.

In response to Commissioner Shanetzky's question, Mr. Brimlow replied that federal grant opportunities are not currently open; however, staff met with the Department of Justice (DOJ), which identified several potential grants the City intends to pursue. Further, the DOJ provided guidance on programming, accreditation standards, and necessary training, i.e. mental health.

Mayor Drosky reiterated his concerns regarding the current staffing levels and Deerfield Beach becoming a training ground. Further, he expressed concerns with the RedSpeed program not being currently monitored by the BSO.

Mr. Gladieux stated that, effective April 16, 2026, the BSO will no longer provide deputies to testify in hearings related to notices of violation they have issued.

Vice Mayor Hudak stated that the actions by the BSO are extremely disappointing, but hopes that the situation improves, as the residents deserve better. Further, he stated that the RedSpeed program is not about revenue, but about ensuring the safety of our children.

Commissioner Plaut expressed disappointment with the lack of collaboration from the BSO and stated that the City must move quickly to obtain local control.

In response to Commissioner Preston's question, Mr. Brimlow replied that the City does have the capacity to review RedSpeed violations, and staff is currently evaluating the process.

Commissioner Preston suggested suspending the program until the goals and objectives can be met.

Mr. Brimlow stated that the program is currently suspended; however, he reiterated that deputies are still patrolling the areas.

The Cove - Mr. Brimlow said staff will review the Code regarding the back-in parking.

Florida Recreation and Parks Association (FRPA) Journal - Greg Warner, Director of Parks & Recreation, provided a brief overview of the journal and stated that the Johnny L. Tigner Community Center and Peggy Noland Aquatics Complex were featured.

CITY COMMISSION BUSINESS**15. Consideration to approve the voting delegates to the 2026-2027 Board of Directors for Broward League of Cities.**

There was a brief discussion to select Commissioner Plaut as the voting delegate, Mayor Drosky as the alternate, and Vice Mayor Hudak as the second alternate for the Broward League of Cities.

Mayor Drosky opened the public hearing.

Roger Freitag, 418 SE 2nd Street, Deerfield Beach, asked about the role of the Broward League of Cities and how it benefits the taxpayers.

Mayor Drosky closed the public hearing.

Commissioner Plaut provided a brief overview of the Broward League of Cities and its role.

16. Discussion regarding participation in the All-America City Award.

Commissioner Shanetzky provided a brief overview of the award. Thereafter, he expressed the importance of showcasing Deerfield Beach, and stated that the City is in competition with neighboring municipalities.

Vice Mayor Hudak agreed with Commissioner Shanetzky. Thereafter, he commented on property values, particularly on the barrier island, and emphasized the need for revitalization. Further, he is uncertain of the award structure and its potential benefit to the City at this time.

Commissioner Plaut commented on the submission requirements and the potential costs to the City. Further, he agreed with Vice Mayor Hudak, as he is unsure of the potential benefit at this time.

Vice Mayor Preston stated that although the deadline has passed, he believes the timing is appropriate to allow staff sufficient opportunity to promote the City and develop a cohesive vision.

Mayor Drosky explained that the award requires a financial commitment, whereby, recipients must pay \$100,000 upon winning. Further, participation would also require the City to send a team out of state to attend a conference, resulting in additional expenses. Thereafter, he commented on the potential staff involvement. Mayor Drosky spoke in support of promoting the City, as he is a strong proponent of self-promotion to ensure the City's story is accurately and effectively communicated; however, he stated that any individual awards would need to be clearly defined and specific.

Commissioner Shanetzky agreed with self-promotion, and hopes that the City will pursue additional awards in the future.

17. Discussion and potential action regarding the creation of a Public Safety Advisory Board.

After a brief discussion, it was the consensus of the Commission to have Commissioner Shanetzky work with city staff to bring forward an ordinance establishing a Public Safety Advisory Board.

Public Safety - Commissioner Shanetzky stated that the City must have fully operational police and fire departments on October 1, 2027, so pursuing grant opportunities is essential to support this goal.

Century Village - Commissioner Shanetzky commented on a community meeting regarding scam fraud, bicycle/pedestrian safety, etc. Further, on April 22nd, the Area Agency on Aging of Broward County, VA counselor, and Broward County Property Appraiser Office will be present in the main party room of the Clubhouse to provide assistance and resources to residents. On April 27th, in the same location, there will be a Public Safety workshop.

South Florida Bible College - Commissioner Shanetzky said a block party will be held on campus April 18th from 5:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m.

Crystal Lake - Commissioner Shanetzky commented on a meeting regarding the Tam O'Shanter Golf Course.

District 3 Meeting - Commissioner Shanetzky said the meeting will take place on Monday, April 6th at 1:00 p.m. at the Meadows at Crystal Lake.

COMMISSIONER PLAUT**DISTRICT 4**

Florida League of Cities - Commissioner Plaut provided a brief overview of the organization and its role in supporting municipalities, especially in identifying and securing grant funding opportunities. Thereafter, he thanked Jonathan Salas, Director of Community Services, and his staff for their efforts.

District 1 Meeting - Commissioner Plaut commended Vice Mayor Hudak for his efforts with the meeting. Thereafter, he urged everyone to sign up for the BuckyGram.
